popular, but I always recommend spending enough time in Tuscany to wander around and find your favorites. Here are a few of mine:

Cortona: It has history, Etruscan influences, fantastic views, great restaurants, enotecas and shops. You can roam the streets for hours.

Arezzo: This is a fully functioning, working city. It's two cities really—modern and commercial outside the walls and interesting in the historical center. It also has great restaurants and shops and is Italy's gold capital.

Montepulciano, Pienza and Montalcino: These are a perfect threesome for a day or evening trip. Wines in Montepulciano, Vino Nobile and Rosso Montepulciano are consistently great, and wines in Montalcino, Brunello and Rosso Montalcino are excellent as well. Pienza, designed as the perfect plan for a city by Pope Pio, whose name it bears, is one main street with side streets and alleys opening up to great vistas of rolling hillsides and valleys. Pienza is known for its cheeses and meats. Siena: Second in size only

to Florence, Siena is spread out. Full of history, it's home to the Palio horse race held in the main piazza twice each summer. Every neighborhood, sporting specific colors, takes part in the race. It's remarkable to watch, particularly from the vantage point of a hotel

**San Gimignano:** Built to defend itself, the city once boasted more than 70

on the square.





towers. Today, only a handful remain. You can climb to the top of them for spectacular views. The city also has great shops and restaurants.

Tuscany has other wonderful cities, such as Florence, Fiesole, San Sepolcro, Lucca, Pisa, Viareggio, Follonica, Montacatini Terme, Montacatini Alto and Chuisi, as well as many small, quaint villages.

My advice is to get lost and let the road take you to these places, where you'll meet warm, friendly people proud of their towns, their food and their wines.
