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experience these traditions, of course, is to visit Italy at Christmas and stay through to Epiphany on Jan. 6.

One of the most important ways Italians like to celebrate Christmas is with nativity manger scenes.

Using a manger, or crib, to tell the Christmas story was popularized by St. Francis of Assisi in 1223. He had visited Bethlehem and saw where it was thought that Jesus was born.

Today, many Italian families display nativity scenes in their homes, as I observed during my only Christmastime visit to Italy.

The city of Naples in Italy is world-famous for its crib-making and cribs, known as presepe Napoletano, or Neapolitan cribs. The first crib scene in Naples, in the Church of Santa Maria, is thought to date back to 1025. Displaying cribs in the home became popular in the 16th century, and its popularity continues.

A special feature of Neapolitan crib scenes is that they always include extra everyday people and objects, such as houses, food, animals and even figures of famous people and

politicians. The figure of the baby Jesus isn't added until the evening of Dec. 24.

Naples also is home to the world's largest crib scene, with more than 600 objects in it. If you ever visit Naples at Christmastime, be sure to see the street of nativity scene makers called the Via San Gregorio Armeno.

For many Italian-American families, a big Christmas Eve meal of various fish dishes—known as the Feast of the Seven Fishes, or Festa dei Sette Pesci—is now a popular holiday tradition.

The feast, which seems to have its roots in southern Italy and Sicily, was brought to the United States by Italian immigrants in the 1800s. This is the night for anyone who loves seafood.

In Italy, holiday celebrations start eight days before Christmas with special novenas, a series of prayers and church services.

On Epiphany night, children believe that an old woman named Befana brings presents for them, so they hang stockings by the fireplace for Befana to fill. In parts of northern Italy, the three kings might bring

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prepare and serve a dinner for the residents and their family members.

Afterward, Lidie sent the Dante Club this letter of thanks:

“What an amazing experience we had yesterday! A great turnout and so much laughter filled the room for this event. I spent the morning reflecting back with such gratitude and appreciation for all who pitched in and helped to make this event possible for our tenants.

On Saturday, Nov. 17, I had the opportunity to stop by my oldest daughter's place of business in Sacramento—the Dante Club, a special-events center. I had run over on the off-chance I could talk with the chef to get some ideas on how to most effectively pull off a dinner for all of the tenants at our new community, West Beamer Place.

When I arrived, I was able to meet with Chef Jessi Moreno and her cook, Dawn Emerick. I shared that our staff had volunteered to each cook various portions of the meal in their homes and bring them to our property to provide a Welcome Home Holiday Meal to our formerly displaced and homeless residents.

Many of us have cooked for large families but not on a scale of 100 to 125 people and with limited resources. We wanted to make sure we were educated and ready to put forth our best efforts.

When Jessi asked me what specifically we were doing, I shared that we hoped to host a community dinner for no less than 100 to 125 residents and family members.

After just minutes of explaining what Mercy Housing does and our mission and values, the Dante Club stepped up and volunteered to not only donate some turkeys and side dishes to our event but also to prepare, transport and serve the food to our entire property.

When I reminded them that we hoped to serve this meal in just three days, they unanimously and eagerly insisted that they wanted to be a part of our event.

To ensure they had the full support of the Dante Club board, Kim Guterding and Jessi Moreno sent a quick email to the board to get permission. Within minutes, they received notification granting them full support and permission to make the donations and to open up the Dante Club facility to cook our meal. There was not even a brief hesitation when I explained that our property was in Woodland, 31 miles away.

At 4 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 20, their team arrived with the food

they generously donated and took the additional responsibility off our staff for the balance of the meal preparations. They prepared the entire meal and loaned us hot plates, linens, utensils, serving dishes and other necessary materials to present our dinner as if we were a full banquet location. It was such an amazing opportunity to come together and be able to offer this meal to our community.

Our Yolo County partners not only attended our event, but some of the case managers, Sammy Hawk and Rosie Morales, pitched in and served and prepped some of the meal with us.

We feel very blessed by our partnerships. We so appreciated the generosity and respect shown to our tenants by this amazing business. Please remember the Dante Club in your thoughts of gratitude, as it truly demonstrated generosity, community service and stewardship kicking off this holiday season.”

# Board approves changes after social survey

## MEMBERS ENCOURAGED TO KEEP THEIR IDEAS AND SUGGESTIONS COMING YEAR-ROUND

At its December meeting, the Dante Club board approved several changes designed to better meet members' needs and expectations.

The changes are based on responses to a social activities survey that members completed in November. Here's a summary of the approved changes:

1. A three-member committee will monitor and direct the quality and Italian authenticity of food served at Tuesday Night and member dinners. Committee members Richard Battistessa, Michael Micchiche and Michael Talani will work with the club manager and cook to set menus and recipes. They also will listen to member comments and provide feedback to the manager, cook and advisory committee. Members are encouraged to share opinions and suggestions about meals.

2. A floor manager will oversee dinners to help ensure that members have an exceptional experience.

3. The price for member dinners will be \$13 with a reservation and \$18 without. This is designed to encourage reservations, so the club manager can better estimate food purchases. Complimentary beer and wine with dinner will continue, as will half-price drinks for members. Typical pricing for comparable private-event dinners is \$35 to \$40.

4. The Tuesday dinner price will be reduced from \$28 to \$25.

5. The board will monitor the sound system, but speakers should speak into the microphone. Anyone

in the back of the room who can't hear should stand up and say so.

6. An Italian flag will be on display at all member events.

7. Pitchers of water will be on tables at all member events.

8. Members will be asked about starting member dinners earlier, at about 6:30 p.m.

9. Members will be asked about serving spumoni for dessert.

10. Free hot dogs, beer and soft drinks will be served during the club's annual Easter egg hunt.

11. Members will be asked about moving the annual Mother's Day brunch from Mother's Day to the Saturday before.

12. The Viva Vino event will be held on a Saturday in October in an effort to improve attendance.

13. Member events will feature more Italian music.

14. Dante Club at the River Cats will be a day game this year, on a Saturday or a Sunday, so more families and children can attend.

15. At the July and August steak barbecues, cooks will fire up the grills earlier and include mushrooms and onions as accompaniments.

16. The golf committee will consider moving the tournament closer to the Dante Club. It's now held at the Bartley Cavanaugh Golf Course in south Sacramento.

17. Members will be asked if their younger sons and grandsons should be allowed to attend the Sausage Stag Feed with their parents and grandparents.

18. Members will be asked about having bocce ball before member dinners.

19. The price of the Christmas dinner will be kept as low as possible, and large families will not be split up.

20. The bar service will be improved to ensure faster and better service for members.

21. The board will consider increasing member benefits in the coming year. Members can now get reduced-cost dinners, half-price drinks and room rentals for member events, free beer at member dinners and other free or reduced-cost social events.

22. Leftover food will be put in take-home containers and sold to members for a moderate price.

23. The new manager will be charged with developing and implementing a comprehensive marketing program to better publicize the Dante Club as a banquet facility and to improve the club's business performance.

24. The board will examine the costs and benefits of establishing a modestly priced Dante Club private-label wine.

The Dante Club board of directors thanks everyone who participated in the survey and who offered suggestions.

Social chairman Tom Novi and his committee hope the changes the board has approved will help improve members' experience at the Dante Club and better serve all members in the coming year.
