• The walk-in refrigerator has undergone a complete makeover.

In addition to a deep cleaning of the fridge, the surrounding walls and floor have been painted, a leaking compressor repaired, the inside refrigerator sealed, new shelving installed and the entry door realigned so it will open and close without bending its hinges.

Plagues and pandemics? Humans have seen their share

Humans have been plagued by influenza ever since their transition to a more agrarian way of life 10,000 years ago.

As populations further condensed living spaces and as travel increased, the protective local silo restriction effect on the spread of influenza viruses first decreased, then disappeared. Pandemics of the influenza virus then became not only possible but probable.

More recent global plagues and pandemics have repeatedly culled the human species but have never led to its extinction.

In 1889, the first great global influenza pandemic of H3N8, or H2N2 flu, began in Siberia and Kazakhstan and was therefore named the Russian flu. In one year, the infection took more than 360,000 lives worldwide.

In 1918, a sentinel outbreak of H1N1 flu in Madrid that may have originated in China was named the Spanish flu. This influenza A virus was responsible for

more than 50 million deaths worldwide. In the United States, the flu's so-called "cytokine storms" caused lung hemorrhage and edema, specifically attacking young adults and killing more than 675,000 people.

The word "quarantine," derived from the Italian word "quaranta," means 40. During the plague of the Middle Ages, ships were mandated to stay out of ports for a period of 40 days if they harbored suspected infectious cargo. Public isolationism, although a well-known health protective mechanism, wasn't rapidly deployed to protect the masses from the Spanish flu, even though it was equally well-known that Henry VIII had quarantined himself to escape the Black Plague.

In 1957, two consecutive waves of an H2N2 flu, which originated in Southwest China at Guizhou and was named the Asian flu, killed more than 2 million globally and more than 116,000 in the United States.

In 1968, an H2N2 antigenic shift created a reassortment H3N2, which was called the Hong Kong flu, that killed more than a million people globally and 33,800 in the United States.

In 1977, an H1N1 Russian flu attacked a global population that was partially immune because of previous infection with an H1N1 viral configuration.

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In 1997, an avian, or bird, flu at Guangdong Province, China, evolved to cause bird-to-human infection.

This novel
H5N1 influenza
virus caused acute respiratory
failure, first accurately documented
in Hong Kong poultry markets
where the direct bird-to-human
infection killed a 3-year-old boy.

Fortunately, that virus was contained, resulting in only six deaths, but it had a prepandemic fatality rate of nearly 50 percent.

If the H5N1, or Southeast Asia H7N1, mutate their bird-to-human infectious RNA further to permit a potentially fatal human-to-human infectious spread, the worst

influenza pandemic in human history may yet arrive.

In 2003, the coronavirus that led to Severe Acute Respiratory
Syndrome, or SARS, was classified as a novel virus in infected bats, cats and, finally, humans in China, but it was not classified as a pandemic because only about 8,000 people died.

Province,

China, but its

potential

severity went

unrecognized.

Deadly Zika and Ebola viruses were successfully contained and never reached pandemic proportions.

In 2009, a new strain of influenza A, an H1N1/09 "swine flu" virus, evolved. It may have originated in birds and pigs before reassortment with a human strain.

Perhaps originating

in Mexico, the resulting pandemic killed more than 280 million globally.

In the United States, despite recognition as an official national emergency, the virus caused more than 60 million cases and resulted in more than 12,000 to possibly 20,000 unaccounted deaths.

In November 2019, a new coronavirus arose in Hubei Province, China, but its potential severity went unrecognized. The virus formed in a See PLAGUES, Page 9

• The stage and its accompanying storage space have received a facelift and now feature new electrical components, a new door and a fresh coat of paint.

• The sewage and drain lines leading to Little Magpies Preschool have been cleaned. We await a proposal for replacing the cast iron drains under the building and the grease trap in the kitchen, as both are deteriorating.

Future projects include:

- Doing a makeover of the women's bathroom near the kitchen
- Partially or completely remodeling the kitchen and bar areas
- Removing the wallpaper and texturing and painting the walls in the men's and women's bathrooms by the bar
- Repairing the roof on the main building and the Magpies school
- Resloping and repacking the parking lot and adding islands and drainage, especially in the area behind the building
- Adding plants and doing fence work along the property's outside perimeter And much, much more.

Group lobbies city to recognize deep Italian roots of east Sacramento

Sacramento's longtime Italian American community is currently pursuing a new initiative with the city of Sacramento.

The community is asking the city to recognize and designate the neighborhood of east Sacramento as the Little Italy Historic District.

"It is important for Italian Americans to preserve the local memory of Little Italy and the Italian history of the neighborhood," said Bill Cerruti, executive directive of the Italian Cultural Society of Sacramento, which is involved in the effort. "Recognizing Little Italy would be a tribute to those generations of Italians who settled there and created a way of life for the Italian people."

Cerruti said the designation also would provide a greater awareness of the neighborhood's strong Italian heritage and provide a sense of connection to the larger Italian community of the Sacramento region and the state.

In recent years, several California cities, including San Diego, San Jose and San Pedro, have created Little Italy historic zones to revitalize their historically Italian-populated areas.

The cities have identified these zones in a variety of ways, with arches, banners, flags, monuments, piazzas and festivals, to celebrate the Italian heritage of the communities.

Committee proposes changes in club bylaws

Ron Fiorica and his bylaws committee have been reviewing club bylaws, some of which date back to the club's inception in 1926.

To better reflect the times, the committee has proposed these changes, which will be presented when club meetings resume:

Nonsubstantive, semi-technical

- changing the word "shall" to "may"
- renumbering certain agenda items
- combining the position titles of financial secretary and treasurer to treasurer/financial secretary

Substantive

- combining advisory and finance committees and their duties
- combining membership and investigating committees and their duties
- shortening the bylaws amendment process from three to two months by voting in the second month
- reducing the bylaws amendment vote requirement from two-thirds of those present to a majority of those present
- increasing terms of the board of directors from one to two years
- having club officers assume their duties at the time of election
- adding duties to the role of recording secretary
- changing the term "club room" to "Dante Club facility"

reassortment of genetics, combining a duck strain with a human strain.


In December, a further coronavirus genetic reassortment of viral RNA sequencing with animal and human viral strains occurred in Wuhan, China. The virus soon made a quick mutational jump to two powerfully infectious strains that rapidly transmitted a lung infection, human to human.

A treating physician, Dr. Li Wenliang, reported news of the novel coronavirus, called COVID-19, to other healthcare workers but ultimately contracted it himself and died within a month.

Eventually, COVID-19 took hold worldwide this year, with countries instituting strict social distancing practices in the hope of isolating and containing the virus and saving lives until a vaccine can be developed.

In World War II, the general public unified around a common national purpose. The COVID-19 pandemic could provide a similar unifying force with issues such as public education, healthcare delivery and environmental awareness.
