Keeping club connection strong takes commitment

Reading Ralph DiLibero's piece on the Italian experience in America for this month's *Inferno*, I was reminded of one of the things I hold dear about the Dante Club: the connection to those who came to Sacramento and started our organization back in 1926.

I don't dwell on it often (maybe I should), but it's hard to imagine that my dad's family left Calabria in 1905 and settled here in 1915—106 years ago. I wonder what Sacramento looked like in 1915.

My family's connection to Sacramento and the Dante Club runs deep, spanning three generations. I feel a real bond with both my biological family and my club family that I don't find elsewhere.

It's a big part of who I am. As my grandmother used to say: It's in my DNA.

Bookings bonanza and a baby: That was the August that was

ugust 2021 was one for the record books at the Dante Event Center.

After immense marketing efforts, great customer service and lots of word of mouth by event center staff, this August was one of the first in years to be profitable, according to general manager Jennifer Peretti.

The event center hosted 24 events throughout the month, including weddings, baby showers, birthday parties, engagement parties and two charity events.

"We are so excited to see where things will lead us in the future," Peretti said.

Peretti reports that September and October are "jam-packed months," with the return of monthly meetings of local organizations, as well as many bookings for weddings, anniversaries, celebrations of life and conferences. Peretti not only managed all this See BOOKINGS, Page 5

Advisory and finance update

The advisory and finance committee met Sept. 8 to review Dante Event Center operations, the club's financial condition and the status of facility repairs and renovations.

General manager Jennifer Peretti discussed business activity and bookings. The 25 August events were profitable, she reported.

She said a substantial number of events have been booked for September, and more events are coming in daily.

She also said customer reviews have averaged 4.4 stars out of 5, making the month positive in terms of business and customer satisfaction. Peretti also said nearly every weekend is booked through the end of the year.

The Tuscan Room air conditioning compressor had to be replaced at a cost of \$9,600. Event center maintenance continues as a high priority, with weekly inspections and repairs.

Peretti also reviewed her plans to monitor and manage the event center during her upcoming pregnancy leave.

The committee reviewed and approved the Dante Club policy manual update for presentation to the board.

Buildings and grounds

The buildings and grounds committee has recommended removal of a tree near the bocce courts, which an arborist found to be failing, at a cost of \$2,000.

A new awning for the Magpie School was requested, at a cost of \$1,263. The current awning is tearing and cannot be repaired. Both items were approved. A mulberry on the event center grounds was cut into 18-inch lengths and offered to members at no charge. A new awning will be installed by Oct. 31.

Rain gutters and gutter guards for the back of the Magpie School, at a cost of \$2,530, were requested and approved, but installation will be delayed until the earth behind the building can be graded to ensure that water runoff drains away from the building and parking lot.

All expenditures were based on a consideration of multiple bids.

The treasurer's report was positive for business activity, profitability and the club's overall fiscal condition.

Drinks policy revisited

A few years ago, the Dante Club board decided to offer half-price drinks as a benefit for members, who received cards that could be used at any Dante event. The benefit was given only to members, not to friends or family.

Last year the state Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control informed our Dante Event Center manager that when reduced-price drinks are offered, they must be offered to all attendees, not just members.

After some debate on how to implement this requirement, the board recently decided to allow all attendees at all Dante Club member events, including friends and family, to partake of the half-price drink policy.

However, when the center is booked by an outside group, which accounts for the vast majority of special events, or by a club member hosting a personal event, attendees must pay full price for drinks.

This new policy expands the drink benefit to friends and family, is consistent with ABC regulations and provides an even greater Dante Club member benefit.

Italian peasant families from those regions, such as the Casellis, began their American experience on the East Coast in cities such as New York and Boston, but they soon sought opportunity across the continent. In 1849, the California Gold Rush was underway, but the transcontinental railroad wasn't yet completed.

So Italian immigrants with their eyes on San Francisco or the gold mines of Sonora had to take long and circuitous routes, including through Central America.

Vincenzo Caselli sailed through the Nicaragua straits in 1853, labored in the mines and then as a gardener until he eventually unleashed his entrepreneurial spirit by purchasing 60 acres just outside of Sacramento.

Today, John Caselli, his great grandson, is editor of the *Dante's Inferno* newsletter.

Also from Lucca, Angelo and Angelina Casali migrated to New York in 1901.

The railroad brought a son, Giovanni, to California in 1934. A grandson, Jim, settled in Sacramento to become an accountant and building contractor.

By 1919, families migrating from the same region in Italy, such as the Novi family, had to pass through an immigration station at Ellis Island, migrate as far west as Michigan, then work as firemen or

engineer-mechanics for the transcontinental railroad to finally reach the neighborhoods of Roseville and Sacramento.

Many immigrants still faced incarceration during World War II despite their hardlaboring sons joining the U.S. Army.

Second-generation Italian-Americans, such as Dante Club vice president Tom Novi, were blessed by their See STORIES, Page 9

forefathers' efforts, giving them an educational leg up to attend colleges.

Most immigrants embarking from the port of Palermo in the 1880s, such as the Mezzanares family, first settled in New Orleans.

Before they could afford to start up their own independent business trades, they first had to find transitional jobs.

Railroad construction offered that opportunity, and Sacramento became a popular western final destination.

The immigrants settled in tenement apartments or flats two- or three-story buildings with





as many as three bedrooms per flat.

Their first settled area in Sacramento, known as Alkali Flats, was bounded by the railroad station and tracks to the north, G Street to the south, 7th Street to the west and 12th Street to the south.

That growing population of Italian immigrants then ventured a few blocks farther south into a newer neighborhood called Mansion Flats.

Mezzanares family descendant Tom Mezzanares is our current Dante Club treasurer.

Many Italian Americans migrated to the Sacramento area from Sicily, along with Albanese and Arberesh immigrants, to work on the Southern Pacific Railroad. Needing the ability to walk to work, they usually settled in the Alkali Flats neighborhood.

The Zuccaro family moved from San Jose to Sacramento's Mansion Flats at 23rd and D streets in 1924.

Family members were employed by Southern Pacific. The Zuccaro grandson, Richard Zuccaro, is a current Dante Club member.

Pat Orelli, a retired member of the Dante Club board who worked for many years as an accountant in Sacramento, is the great grandson of Agustino Orelli, who in 1852 emigrated from Ticino, Switzerland, via New

York to Georgetown.

Great grandfather Orelli then participated in three migrations across the Isthmus of Panama to San Francisco during the Gold Rush. He worked as a rancher, shopkeeper and mortician.

Pat Orelli's grandfather Orelli moved to Southern California and produced a Long Beach-born son, Christopher, who settled in Placerville.

Dante Club member Fred Pasquini's grandfather—also named Fred Pasquini, per Italian tradition—left Lucca in 1890 to eventually settle in Sacramento by way of New York in the early 1900s.

Fred Pasquini's maternal grandfather, Vito Sclifo, left Piana

degli Albanesi and went first to New Orleans in the early 1900s, then to Chicago.

He finally settled at in a Front Street railroad flat in Sacramento, where he worked as a carpenter.

Grandfather Pasquini established a bar on 3rd Street between J and K streets. Father, known as "Nib," and mother Ann met in Sacramento and married in 1934.

Nib worked for Southern Pacific and later at Muzio Bakery. Ann taught elementary school. A sister, Marianne, also had a career in teaching.

Nib died at the early age of 43, leaving Ann to raise her two children alone.

Active club board member Ernie Tomassilli traces his family back 500 years to farm workers in Pratola Peligna L'Aquila, Abruzzo, Italy.

His parents, Sebastiano Tomassilli and Luigia Bice Liberatore, married in 1930. Sebastiano traveled back and forth across the Atlantic to see his family, eventually settling in 1936 in Steubenville, Ohio, where he called for his wife and two siblings.

The men worked in a steel mill and joined a patriotic club, the Pratolana Mutual Benefit Society, that traveled to picnic spots and baseball games.

Born in Steubenville in 1944, Ernie Tomassilli moved to San Jose after serving in the U.S. Army. He pursued a career in medical sales for 30 years. He moved to Sacramento in 1988. See STORIES, Page 11

The club's Ron Pane traces his roots to brothers Antonio and Giuseppe Pane, who emigrated

from Panettiere, Calabria, to New York in 1905.

Giuseppe went on to Joliet, Ill., and Antonio returned to Italy to marry and then return to Joliet in 1913 with his wife, Maria Melania. In 1915, a railroad job brought Giuseppe to Sacramento, where he produced six sons and one daughter. Son Julio had two sons, Ronnie and Paul, who found employment in the Sacramento criminal justice system. Ron is the current Dante Club president.

Antonio followed his brother to Sacramento in 1918, with six daughters and one son. Son John ran the Clover Club on Folsom Boulevard. Daughter Elizabeth married Donald Waldron, producing a daughter, Marie, and a son, Johnny, who ran a barbershop. All the families still live near M and J streets.

Migration to Sacramento never really ended. I know of one Italian immigrant born near Cassino, Italy, who migrated to Providence, Rhode Island, in 1906 as an infant, and whose son migrated to Sacramento a century later, in 2006: Raffaello Giovanni DiLibero.
