Advisory and finance

At the board of directors meeting on Sept. 12, we were advised that the walk-in cold-storage box in the kitchen is failing. If the box fails, the Dante Event Center could not continue to provide meals to our customers.

So the board approved funds to replace the walk-in box and repair the ceiling above it, which was damaged by evaporating water from the box.

We recently installed a new air conditioning unit and smoke alarms that are monitored by AT&T. Funds for these projects were made available because of the recent remodel of the Dante Event Center and the fantastic job general manager Jennifer Peretti and her staff are doing.

George Procida and Ron Pane are in the process of creating a longterm replacement plan to help us budget for major projects such as paving and roof replacement. Currently, the inside and outside doors are not working properly, so we need to repair or replace the doors as needed to keep them operating correctly and to keep the building secure.

There is a continuing need for maintenance and repairs, so the Building Capital Improvement Fund would greatly benefit from donations from our members and friends

Controversial Columbus still gets his day

hy Columbus Day? Cristoforo Colombo, aka Christopher Columbus, was born in Genoa, Italy, in 1451, but as an adult, he lived in Portugal and finally settled in Spain.

Columbus lives in infamy as the "discoverer" of the New World, now known as the Americas.

While many argue that because native Americans already lived there, the land was not actually discovered. Still others argue that Leif Erikson discovered the New World.

Native Americans were, indeed, in residence, but they were originally misidentified as "Indians" because the navigation techniques of the day were inaccurate, and the Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria ships had the wrong idea of where they had landed.

Leif Erikson, the daring Nordic explorer, may have landed somewhere in the Americas several centuries earlier. So why do we not celebrate his discovery with a day eating lutefisk and singing Viking songs?

Columbus first went to sea as a teen, almost losing his life on an Atlantic voyage when French privateers attacked and burned his ship. He aspired to find a better avenue to the spice trade in Asia. Columbus designed a threeship voyage westward and presented it to Portugal, Genoa and Venice. He was rejected each time. Finally, he lobbied the monarchy of Spain, which put him on retainer to keep him around. Some years later, when Spain regained control of Granada, the monarchy approved the plan.

Columbus first landed in what is now known as the Bahamas, and he found the natives friendly and open to trade. He and his crew then continued to Cuba and thought it was China. Next he arrived in Hispaniola, now Haiti and the Dominican Republic, and posited that it could be Japan. When returning to Spain,

New member profile: Joseph Bonacci

Joseph Bonacci, who recently joined the Dante Club, has been immersed in Italian culture all his life. He is very happy to share his stories and experiences with fellow club members.

Bonacci comes from Scranton, which is the cultural center of northeastern Pennsylvania. The region's anthracite coal mining industry attracted a large influx of Italian immigrants, particularly from Gubbio, to work long hours underground, digging up hard, black coal, as they sought the American dream.

Anthracite, the highest ranking of all coals, possesses the highest carbon and fewest impurities of all coal types. Northeastern Pennsylvania's coal region has the largest known deposits of anthracite coal in the world.

As the region's population grew, Italians who made the voyage to an unfamiliar land brought their culture with them. Introduced to nearby Jessup, Pennsylvania, in 1909, la Festa dei Ceri celebrates the life and legacy of Sant'Ubaldo, patron saint of Gubbio, Italy. The Eugubini built wooden pillars similar to those used during the festival in Gubbio and began running through the town's streets just as they had done for generations.

Today, thousands of spectators from around the world watch teams representing Sant'Ubaldo, San Giorgio and Sant'Antonio race through the streets of Jessup every Memorial Day weekend.

The most fulfilling aspect of our shared history is the realization that, despite our many commonalities, Italian culture in America is as diverse as our descendants.

> • In 1805, Thomas Jefferson recruited a group of musicians from Sicily to form a military

band, which ultimately became the renowned U.S. Marine Corps Band.

- In 1851, Giovani Nobili founded what became one of the finest private universities in the nation, Santa Clara University.
- In 2000, in recognition of the significant persecution Italian Americans suffered

during World War II, President Clinton signed the Wartime Violation of Italian American Civil Liberties Act.

The legislation sought to apologize and make amends for the harm Italian Americans faced during the war with the loss of many of their civil liberties.



Minestrone: perfect comfort food when fall's on the way

MINESTRONE, MA BENE Ingredients:

- 3/4 cup red kidney beans
- 2 pounds beef shanks
- 4 cups water


- 1 35-ounce can peeled tomatoes
- 1 medium onion, sliced
- 1 cup celery, sliced
- 1 cup green beans, fresh or frozen
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 tablespoon basil
- 1 cup sliced zucchini
- 2 cups coarsely shredded cabbage

• 1/3 cup small elbow macaroni

Wash beans. Cover with water and soak overnight. Drain beans and place in kettle with next 10 ingredients. Cover and simmer slowly until meat is easily removed from the bone. Discard bone and fat. Chop meat into bitesize pieces, and return to soup. Add zucchini, cabbage and macaroni. Cover and cook about 20 minutes. Makes about 12 cups of soup. This will cure whatever ails you. Mangia bene.


Columbus regaled the royalty with exaggerated stories of his discoveries. He led several more trips between Spain and the Americas, but this is where things get less attractive and more controversial.
