Advisory and finance, building fund

The advisory and finance committee reminds members that their \$100 dues for 2023 were due Dec. 31. Regarding dues payment, our bylaws state: "Dues will be paid annually in advance. A member who is in arrears in his dues one month will be considered delinquent and will be subject to the following restrictions: He will be ineligible for nomination and election to any office. He may not participate in the nomination or election of officers nor vote on the question that requires a two-thirds majority or the amending of bylaws. A member who is in arrears three months or 90 days (March 31) and has been properly notified by the financial secretary may be dropped from the rolls and lose all rights of a member."

As requested by president Tom Novi, building and grounds committee chairman George Procida has developed a list of equipment and other items at the Dante Event Center that will need attention in the future, with estimated replacement dates and costs.

The advisory and finance committee estimates that over the next 15 years, repair or replacement of such items as air conditioning units and roofing will be needed, at an estimated cost of more than \$600,000. The committee has developed a plan to provide the needed funds.

Beginning this month, a separate reserve account will be funded by regular monthly payments. Funding of the current Building Capital Improvement Fund will continue, but the name will be changed to the Building Improvement/Maintenance Fund and will be used for building and grounds improvements and maintenance. Funding of both accounts to a comfortable level will take time, but the committee and the board of directors believe this will be a move in the right direction to keep the Dante Club running for many years.

The Dante Club received a building fund donation of \$150 from John Bertoni on Dec. 2.

DANTE'S INFERNO



Father of Italian language celebrated

Editor's note: This article, which has been edited slightly for length, is reprinted with permission from the Italian Cultural Society, Sacramento.

In September 2021, Italy commemorated the Year of Dante on the 700th anniversary of the death of Dante Alighieri, considered the father of the Italian language.

Dante was born in Florence, Italy, in 1265 and died in 1321. Throughout its history, Italy has produced many outstanding writers, but the greatest name in Italian literature and one of the giants of western literature, Dante Alighieri, emerged in the 1300s.

Dante's masterpiece, "La Divina Commedia," or "The Divine Comedy," details his fictional journey through Hell (Inferno), Purgatory (Purgatorio) and Paradise (Paradiso) as he encounters figures from history and legend along the way.

Dante wrote his epic poem in the Tuscan language when Latin was the language of the educated. It achieved widespread popularity and became a unifying influence in Italian society at a time when Italy was fractured by political strife, and it helped establish Tuscan as the official language of Italy, even though many dialects were more commonly spoken. Poet T.S. Elliot once wrote, "Dante and Shakespeare divide the modern world between them. There is no third."

Dante's birthplace, the Museo Casa di Dante in Florence's medieval center, is typical of a 13th century tower house. Dante has a tomb in the Church of Santa Croce in Florence, where Michelangelo and other notable Florentines are buried, but his tomb is empty. He is buried instead in Ravenna, where he had taken exile during a political dispute.

Dante's image can be found on Italy's 2 Euro coin as depicted in a painting by Renaissance artist Raphael. Students of the Italian language can also celebrate Dante for making the beautiful Tuscan language the Italian they learn today.

Center had to cancel events because of the pandemic, and the potential for harm to the Dante's business seemed real, with uncertainty the new normal.

But as we wrapped up 2022, these problems seem to be rapidly receding. Masking requirements have been greatly lessened, high inflation rates are declining, and food supply problems have also lessened. Our chef must really appreciate this as he prepares event menus.

In January 2022, the event center hoped for a positive year after struggling through a challenging 2021, but few would have predicted that 2022 would end up as one of the strongest years in event center history. The number of bookings and overall profitability far exceeded expectations.

Congratulations to general manager Jennifer Peretti and her staff for a job well done. This success also allowed the Dante Club board of directors to fund a wide range of repairs and improvements to the center facility as we work to ensure its continued success in the future.

To help ensure future success, the board has, for the first time, developed a 15-year equipment-replacement plan and a mechanism to fund it. It has established a fund that will be used to regularly maintain and improve the facility and grounds.

In 2022, the board made several decisions designed to improve member events, including improving the bocce experience by approving funding for the soon-to-be-installed court lights. We have approximately 50 members playing in the Dante spring, summer and fall tournaments, and many in the Ladies Auxiliary play in their tournament as well.

Another priority was improving member dinners by minimizing business discussions and adding interesting and informative speakers. We celebrated our Italian culture and heritage with events in October, along with numerous articles in the *Inferno* newsletter.

Long-standing events, such as the newly renamed Vic Martinelli/Frank Calcagno Golf Tournament, were strongly supported, with the golf tourney generating thousands of dollars for scholarships.

The member-prepared cioppino dinner in March was outstanding and well attended, as were the July and August barbecues.

And members continued to opine on everything from dinner menus to social events. The board listened and made a number of changes to menus and events in an effort to enhance members' experience.

Finally, I would be remiss if I failed to recognize and thank Ladies Auxiliary members for their help with Dante Club events, including providing articles about Italy and Italian culture to the newsletter. Debra Cattuzzo has done a great job as president, and auxiliary members have pitched in time and again to help with club activities and fundraising events.

So as we wrap up 2022 on a very positive note, we need to look forward to the next chapter, 2023. The event center is showing strong advance bookings, with more than 25 weddings already on the schedule, and the board will continue its work on behalf of the membership.

But remember, the heart of Dante *is* the membership. So I ask that members willingly participate whenever possible, whether attending a member dinner or special event or responding to requests for help on an event or project. I sincerely thank all who have stepped up to lead or help on various committees and projects. You should be proud, and remember, as members you are Dante and Dante is you! Grazie and be well.

To kick off the new year, make spaghetti limoncello

T his recipe for spaghetti al limoncello is always a favorite and a highlight when served. It's a little time-intensive to make, but it's oh so good. Buon appetito!

SPAGHETTI AL LIMONCELLO Ingredients:

- 3 tablespoons olive oil
- 16-ounce can of chopped Italian tomatoes
- 1 1/4 ounce of tomato paste
- 2 cloves garlic
- 1/4 glass limoncello
- 1 large onion
- 1 chili pepper
- 1/2 cup fresh parsley
- pepper
- salt

JUST LIKE MOM USED TO MAKE

- handful of ground pistachios
- 1 pound of spaghetti
- clams, mussels, prawns and small squid, if desired
- 1 lemon

Directions:

Finely chop the onion and mince the garlic. Heat the oil and add the chopped onion until it's transparent. Drop in the garlic.

After three minutes, throw in the clam shells and cook them until they open up. Once they open, add the

limoncello and cook until the liquid begins to evaporate.

Next add the chopped tomatoes and tomato paste, pistachios and half the parsley. Add chili pepper, mussels, squid and a little salt and pepper to taste. Cook for five more minutes.

Add in the prawns and bring to a boil. Reduce heat and simmer for 35 minutes while you prepare the spaghetti. Cook the spaghetti with a tablespoon of coarse salt added to the water, until the pasta is al dente.

Drain the spaghetti, place in a big bowl and mix with the sauce.

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Italians specialize in festivals of all types year-round

eed a reason to celebrate? Take a trip to Italy, where Italians love their festivals. You may have heard of the swanky Truffle Festival in Alba, Carnevale in Venice and other locations, and Palio d'Asti in Siena.

But other historic and regional festivals have kept tradition for centuries. Here are a few:

In the Canavesan region of Piemonte, where zucchini is translated as "cusat" (coo-sot), the big summer celebration is the Cusaterra, or festival of the summer squash.

A queen and her court, usually preteens and teenagers in traditional costumes, lead a colorful parade preceding the festival of dancing, music, food and merriment.

Since 1808 in Ivrea, a tradition on the Sunday before Lent is a reenactment of sorts involving a medieval revolt, led by a miller's youthful daughter, against an evil duke in the 1100s.

throwing oranges at the treasured horses is strictly prohibited.

It is estimated that 7,000 people visit this small town annually (except from 2020 to 2022) to witness the battle.

Until the fall of the Republic of Venice in 1797, the Doge of Venice would declare the city's maritime dominance by tossing a gold ring into the Adriatic.

Now Sposalitizio, or Marriage of the Sea, is re-created on the feast of the Ascension, with the mayor, attired in full royal regalia, acting as the Doge.

La Quintana is a medieval jousting tournament and procession, complete with costumes and ceremony, held in August in the Marche region. In October, near Mt. Etna, the town of Bronte hosts the Pistachio Festival where you can find the nuts in granita, Nutella, pesto and gelato.

May brings the Cannoli and Cassata Festival to the south, and the Artichoke takes center stage in Cerda every April 25.

Lactose intolerants—and a significant number of Italians are beware! The Sicilian town of Vinzinni celebrates the Sagra Della Formaggio and Ricotta Festival every April. For three days, there's music, cultural events and (no surprise) cheese, cheese.

Religious-based festivals, such as those celebrating the Ascension and the Epiphany, are common in Italy. Many small towns honor their patron saints with parades, music, Mass and regional and historical costumes, such as in Santa Rosalia in Palermo, San Giorgio in Ragusa, San Gennaro in Naples and San Giovanni (St. John the Baptist) in several locales.

This is how Italy perpetuates its culture and traditions. In recent years, the Ravenna Festival has even spotlighted a certain historical figure of whom you may have heard: Dante Alighieri (wink).


