June bustin' out all over with special events

une marked the beginning of summer as the Dante Event Center jumped right into the busy wedding season.

Besides weddings, the center hosted an assortment of other events during the month, including graduation parties, anniversary celebrations and various organizations' monthly meetings.

Advisory and finance, building fund

We have seen considerable growth in attendance at many events and bookings at the Dante Event Center. Sunday Family Dinners in the past couple of months have drawn more than 200 attendees. The event center also has received a booking for a plated meal for 300 people. Our chef prepares excellent meals, but food must be hot when it reaches the table if the event center is to continue to attract such bookings. Toward that end, the Dante Club board approved an expenditure of up to \$6,500 to acquire a 125-plate hot box for the kitchen.

We have had a few medical emergencies in the past year. The most recent required that our manager administer CPR, as no one else among the 200 people was properly trained. In an effort to make the event center more medically prepared, the advisory and finance committee authorized the expenditure of \$1,300 to train eight senior staff members in CPR and other first aid procedures. Another \$1,564 was authorized to acquire an automatic external defibrillator, which will be available if help is needed.

Buildings and grounds

During June, the buildings and grounds committee took care of a few small repairs but nothing major. It appears that many of our immediate needs have been handled, and we can settle into a more normal cycle of maintenance and repair at the Dante Event Center.

Save pull tabs

The Dante Club has always prided itself on providing ways for members to give back to our community. For the past five years, Ron Cristoni has worked with the Ronald McDonald House pull-tab program, which helps offset the cost of overnight stays for parents with a hospitalized child.

Cristoni reports that our total donations to date are 1,625 pounds, valued at more than \$1,625.

Members are asked to collect pull tabs from their canned pet foods, sodas and, of course, beer. Dante Club and Ladies Auxiliary members can bring their donations to their meetings.

- 6. Change second vice president's term from two years to one year: FAILED
- 7. Make members' guests pay the actual cost of dinners set by the board and not the member cost: FAILED

speed and not a great player, but he's

Jerry and his wife enrolled their son, Jay, who played a reserve role on the 1986 and '87 teams for Rio. Jerry came to the games when he could and was very supportive of his son and our team. And he was right

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A TREASURED FAMILY LEGACY

Dante Club and auxiliary owe their beginnings to forward-thinking immigrants

y grandparents, Vittorio Panattoni and Paolina Pardini, were born in Viareggio in the Toscana region of Italy. They married in 1903 and had two children. Carlo and Teresa. In 1907, when Teresa, my mother, was 18 months old, Vittorio left Italy where he had worked as a teacher and a printer. He traveled to California with Paolina's brother, a fisherman who had made the trip many times before.

Shortly after arriving in Sacramento, Vittorio purchased a small print shop, the Capital Press. He began writing and publishing the first Italian newspaper in the area, La Capitale, which was published for over 40 years.

After waiting five years in Italy for Vittorio to send steamship tickets, Paolina and the children left Viareggio to join him in Sacramento. When they arrived in New York, her traveling companions got sick, so Paolina and the children traveled by train across the country. She didn't speak

Influence of Italian pioneers strong across north state

The story of Italians in Northern California is a story of individual and collective accomplishment. They came early, lured by the discovery of gold. Then, attracted by the region's climate and resemblance to their native homeland, they stayed.

The descendants of these people still live in the foothill towns of the Mother Lode. A visit to Sutter Creek in Amador County, where their names are emblazoned on historic buildings, or a walk through the Catholic Cemetery at Jackson in Calaveras County attest to the sojourn of these Italian pioneers.

They arrived in great numbers during the mass migration at the turn of the century. The early immigrants came primarily from the northern regions of Italy. It's estimated that sixty percent of California's Italian population is of northern Italian extraction.

The largest settlement arose by San Francisco Bay where the early Italians settled in San Francisco's North Beach District. As the stream of Italian immigration continued, the district became an Italian colony. Italians built a successful cultural and economic community that

a word of English.

After an exhausting trip, they finally joined Vittorio in Sacramento in 1912. Six years later, a third child, Adone, was born.

In 1924, Vittorio was appointed the Italian consular agent for Northern California.

Two years later he decided that the Italian men of Sacramento needed a gathering place to socialize, share ideas, play sports and assist other Italian immigrants in adjusting to the American way of life.

So he founded the Dante Club of Sacramento and became its first president.

Paolina thought that the Italian women of Sacramento also needed a gathering place, so in 1926 she founded the Dante Club Ladies Auxiliary, along with a committee of Italian women. She assisted a family member to become the first president.

The ladies enjoyed socializing, sharing recipes and helping raise funds for charitable causes.

For nearly a decade, Paolina held Italian language classes for children in borrowed classrooms. She served as the first president of the Regina Margherita Lodge for Italian women and volunteered for the Red Cross during World War II.

Vittorio and Paolina were very active in St. Mary's Church, the Italian church of Sacramento.
Paolina was a wonderful cook and excelled at needlework. She often hosted the Italian priests from St. Mary's Church for dinner, and she crocheted altar cloths for the church.

When friends came to visit, they were not able to leave without buying a raffle ticket that she sold for both the church and the Dante Club. Family parties and social events were held at the original Dante Club location on 15th Street.

In 1936, the title of Knight of the Crown of Italy (Cavaliere) was conferred upon Vittorio by King Victor Emanuel. The honor was bestowed for his work on behalf of the Italian people of Northern California and for faithful service as royal consular agent of Italy for the previous 12 years.

Growing up next door to my Nonno and Nonna Panattoni was a cultural experience of food, music and language. My siblings and I were fortunate to have learned to speak Italian from them.

Vittorio and Paolina made several return trips to Viareggio to visit their relatives, but they also embraced their new country, became United States citizens and, in later years, used the names Victor and Pauline.

The Panattonis continued to be active in the Italian community and the Dante Club for the remainder of their lives. Their descendants have also carried on the tradition of Dante Club membership, with some serving as president.

spread throughout the Bay Area. Many Italian families in California can trace their American roots to the North Beach Colony.

By 1859 the first Italian language newspaper in California, *L'ecco Della Patria*, was published semiweekly in San Francisco. By 1931, Italian newspapers operated in Sacramento, Stockton, Martinez and Weed.

Today, the statewide weekly Italian newspaper, *L'Italo-Americano*, is still published in California.

The arrival of the Italians in California coincided with its early settlement by Americans. As a result, the Italians played a vital role in shaping the destiny of California and its economy.

It wasn't very long before Italian fisherman established themselves in fishing villages from Eureka to Benicia, Martinez, Pittsburg, San Francisco, Monterey and Santa Cruz.

By the 1880s, California's waterways were dominated by Italian fishermen and their graceful sailing feluccas.

By 1900, the fishing industry of California had become the second leading fishing enterprise in the United States. By 1910, Italians managed 80 percent of the state's fishing business.

During World War II, Italian fishermen were prevented from using their fishing boats by wartime restrictions on Italian immigrants living along the coast.

Across the state, Italians also settled farmland and played a prominent role in developing today's fruit, vegetable and dairy industries in places including Marin and Sonoma counties, and the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys.

By the 1880s, Italians dominated the fruit and vegetable industry in Northern California.

Italian immigrant Marco
Fontana arrived in the United States
in 1859. Along with another
Ligurian, Antonio Cerruti, he
founded the California Packing
Company in 1889.

Under the popular Del Monte label, their canneries soon became the largest food-processing corporation in the world. Most of their workers were Italian.

One enterprising Italian who left his mark on California was Domenico Ghirardelli, who traveled through the gold mines selling chocolate and hard candies.

Ghirardelli settled in San Francisco after the Gold Rush and founded the Ghirardelli Chocolate empire, with Italian immigrant labor, at the site of the present Ghirardelli Square.

The California wine industry also owes much to the Italian founders of the industry.

In 1881, the Italian Swiss Colony was founded at Asti in Sonoma County by Andrea Sbarbaro as a cooperative of Italian immigrants from the wine-growing regions of Italy.

The colony soon became one of the largest producers of wine and dominated the U.S. wine market during its heyday.

The founding of the Italian Swiss Colony promoted the widespread participation of Italians in the grape and wine industry and their success in the vineyards of the Napa, Sonoma and Central Valleys.

Perhaps the most inspiring of California's Italians was Amadeo Pietro Giannini, known as the "Giant of the West."

Born in San Jose in 1870 of immigrant Italian parents, Giannini organized the Bank of Italy in North Beach, San Francisco, in 1904 to aid his fellow Italians.

Breaking new ground, he established the nation's first statewide system of branch banks by opening branches in the Italian neighborhoods across California. Italians dominated his workforce.

In 1930 Giannini changed the name to Bank of America. Giannini's bank soon became the largest bank in the world.

Italians played a prominent role in the creation of California. Their story is our story, their experience ours. The lasting contributions of Italians are sometimes overlooked, but the enterprise and success of these Italian pioneers is a unique legacy, one shared by all of us.

Linguini dish bursts with tomato and garlic flavors

his is a great summer pasta dish that takes only about 15 minutes to make.

The delightful dish features sweet cherry tomatoes that burst in olive oil and garlic galore, creating the most delicious, slightly sweet and bright pasta.

CHERRY TOMATO PASTA WITH GARLIC AND LOTS OF BASIL

Ingredients:

- 1 pound linguini, cooked
- Kosher salt
- ½ cup olive oil and a little

- 4 cloves of garlic, minced
- 2 pints of cherry tomatoes
- ¼ cup grated Parmesan and a little more
- 1 cup fresh basil with leaves torn
- Flaky sea salt
- Red pepper flakes

Directions:

Saute the garlic, add the cherry tomatoes, and cook until

the tomatoes burst. You can help them along a little by using a spoon to squish them.

Add the cooked pasta to the tomatoes and toss. Stir in Parmesan.

If the sauce is too dry, add a little pasta water and another drizzle of olive oil.

Toss everything together and top with the fresh basil, red pepper flakes and sea salt — plus a little more Parmesan. Well, why not?

Now you're ready to enjoy. Fa molto bene vino rosso. Ecco, mangiare!



I think we may try this for a few meetings, and then we will need to discuss the cost at the November board meeting. The drink and platter did draw people into the bar, which encouraged more socializing among members


It was also helpful for the decorating committee so they could decorate without people milling about in the big room.
