Ham adds a twist to nourishing Italian lentil soup

his month's recipe is for a comforting, nourishing lentil soup that comes from Women's Auxiliary member Linda Norce's family cookbook.

In Italy, the New Year is often celebrated with lentils, for good luck, and served with cotechino or another type of pork sausage.

This Italian American version of Italian lentil soup calls for bacon, hambone and ham shanks, ingredients that are more readily available in the United States.

"My mother always made this for New Year's Day," says Teresa Norce Kimsal, Linda's sister. "She would use the leftover Christmas hambone. We were told to eat the soup so we would have good luck in the coming year. Of course, lentil soup is good anytime."

AMERICAN-STYLE LENTILAND HAM SOUP

Ingredients:

- ¼ pound bacon, chopped coarsely
- 1 large onion, chopped coarsely

JUST LIKE MOM USED TO MAKE

- Hambone and ham shanks (amount can be as desired)
- 4 stalks celery, chopped
- 4 carrots, peeled and chopped coarsely
- Salt and pepper
- 1 pound lentils, rinsed and sorted
- Optional: 1 15- or 28-ounce can diced or stewed tomatoes
- Optional: Rice, small pasta or potatoes, cut in chunks

Directions:

Sauté bacon and onion in a soup pot or kettle. Add hambone and ham shanks. Cover with water, about 3 to 4 quarts. Bring to boil and simmer for about two hours. (Some cooks soak the lentils before cooking them. If this is done, cover lentils with water in a bowl and let them soak while the ham stock is simmering. Drain them when ready to use.) Remove hambone and ham shanks from soup. Remove any meat from the bones and shank and add it back to the soup. Add lentils

(soaked or unsoaked) to soup along with tomatoes, if desired. Let soup simmer, stirring occasionally, until lentils are soft, about 40 minutes to an hour.

The recipe serves eight.

If rice, pasta or potatoes are added to the soup, they may be cooked in the soup or separately and added when the soup is ready to serve.

Preparing them separately can prevent them from cooking too long and getting mushy.

Other ideas to consider:

- •Linda likes to add spinach to this soup.
- In Istria, barley is added. Cook the barley first, then add to soup.
- •In Ustica, Sicily, some cooks add Swiss chard and potatoes to their signature lentil soup.
- For a thicker soup, some cooks like to remove some of the lentils and some broth from the soup, purée them together with an immersion blender and then return the purée to the pot.

WHY I'M PROUD TO BE AN ITALIAN

"Godfather" films pose intriguing paradox

M any will remember the 1950s and 1960s Congressional hearings when the nation was captivated by stories of organized crime and the Mafia.

Cultural stereotypes and prejudice, painted with the broad brush of criminal behavior, haunted ordinary Italian Americans.

Coupled with this negative perception was the concern among many Italian Americans that a forthcoming film, "The Godfather," would add fuel to the fire of prejudice.

What actually occurred was a paradox.

Originally a novel written in the 1970s by Mario Puzo, "The Godfather" was translated by filmmaker Francis Ford Coppola into several award-winning films that captivated the imagination of millions of Americans.

The films tell the story of Don Vito

Want to book a personal event? Don't delay

The Dante Event Center is booking into the 2026 event season. Any club members interested in hosting a personal event at the center should inquire as early as possible.

To host an event, a member must first schedule a meeting with general manager Jennifer Peretti or Dante event coordinator Ashley Perham. Available dates and rooms, type of event, estimated guest count, timing, catering needs and other pertinent details will be discussed.

The member's desired room and date will be placed on hold for two weeks to allow time to decide if the center is the place for the event, without the date getting booked in

the meantime.

At the end of the two weeks, if a security deposit has not been received, the date will be released.

To confirm an event, a deposit must be paid and a contract signed and dated.

Members can rent a banquet room at a 50% discount for a personal event for themselves, for family memberslimited to spouses, parents and children—or for a personally owned business.

Corleone, an Italian immigrant who survives abuse and prejudice to achieve greatness for his family.

The films introduced famous lines into American culture, including "I'm going to make him a deal he can't refuse" and "Luca Brasi sleeps with the fishes."

"The Godfather" starred two great American actors—Marlon Brando, who won an Acadamy Award for

his performance, and a young Al Pacino in his first major role.

The paradox is that two of the greatest films in American film history described many of the negative stereotypes that had

haunted Italian Americans in a way that captured America in an almost mythical way.


The movies might be seen as justification for organized crime. But, in many respects, the businesses of Don Corleone and his family differ very little from the businesses of many American capitalists who simply find a need and fill it.

From Congressional hearings to more recent movies and television series, such as "Goodfellows" and "The Sopranos," America has almost romantically embraced the myth of the Italian crime family.

But in many respects, earlier prejudices against Italian
